






Attendance

Expectations for students travelling to/from school



Student represent Sale High School when travelling to and from school and should:

- Take decisions to keep yourself safe and prevent injuries or accidents.
- Represent our school positively in the community
- Ensure you behave appropriately whilst traveling on public transport



Road Safety



- The Roads outside our school are very busy and can become dangerous at the start and end of school
- Remind your child how to cross the road safely they can be very energetic at the end of the day
- Please park a little further away from the main school gates down a side street making a prior arrangement with your child
- Never park or drop off on the yellow zig zags



Expectations on a page

- 1. Mobile phones must never be seen or heard on school grounds and must be switched off in bags.
- 2. Headphones/Air Pods are not permitted and blend the rules regarding mobile phones.
- 3. The only jewellery allowed is one small earring or small sleeper. *No rings. No chains. No bracelets.*
- 4. Only SHS issued badges can be worn on blazers.
- 5. Fake eye lashes are not permitted.
- 6. Fake nails or overly long nails are not permitted.
- 7. Blazers must be worn at all times in and around the building (exemptions are allowed at break times if for example playing football)
- 8. Follow the Sale High Way.

Jewellery, nails and lashes



The only jewellery allowed is one small earring or small sleeper. No rings. No chains. No bracelets.

Sale High School allow a watch and one small sleeper or stud earring in each ear – other than this, the school operates a **zero tolerance** approach to jewellery and body piercings being worn by its students. These items will be confiscated by staff and locked away. Students will be issued with a receipt and a parent or carer must collect the item.

Complete an activity to raise awareness/funds for your house charity, participate in at least three JLT sessions


Extra-curricular→

Resilience/Friendships

- We recognise that making the change to secondary school can be daunting and an emotionally difficult time for some children
- At the start of year 7 many students can find making new friends confusing
- Children are often friends one day and fall out the next...
- Parents can support them in understanding that as they grow older they don't need to be friends with everyone but still need to get along and learn to work with others





Mobile Phones and Online Safety



- 1. Be open and communicate about their mobile phone and computer usage.
 - Cyber-bullying through social media can be a problem
 - Be aware of what apps and websites your children are using
- 2. Keep phones out of bed
 - Children need more sleep than adults to function at their best
- 3. Explore the real world
 - Going on trips, experiencing new places and meeting new people gives children wider life skills
- 4. Encourage children to speak up if they're feeling down
 - Some aspects of the internet can make us upset, anxious and worried. Talk to your child about how there's nothing wrong with feeling those emotions but it's important not to keep them to themselves
- 5. Support the school's rules on mobile phones
 - Phones must switched off and in the bottom of their bags
 - Phones seen will be confiscated and placed in student services for collection at the end of the day
